

CHAIR MESSAGE

As Board Chair of commonkind, I am delighted to share the results of a year defined by growth, innovation, and profound impact. Our journey - from a grassroots idea to a registered Public Benevolent Institution - has been enriched by the dedication of our volunteers, the commitment of our partners, and the leadership of our CEO that inspires us every day.



commonkind is focused on delivering purposeful results that matter - since 2023, we have provided benevolent relief to more than 4,700 Australians facing disadvantage and distress related to poverty, hunger, and poor health and well-being. This year, 86% of our 407 unique volunteers were children and young people, underscoring the transformative power of early service-learning. Our largest-ever service-learning session saw 130 young changemakers participate in a single event, reflecting a powerful appetite for meaningful community service.

Our programs are well-received, with our Net Promoter Score soaring to 92, well above the sector average, affirming the value and joy our programs bring to participants and partners. Overall, our changemakers contributed 1,190 hours of service this year, accumulating 2,385 hours since our founding. These numbers are more than statistics - they represent lives changed, communities strengthened, and a new generation empowered to lead with empathy.



I am proud to share that commonkind continues to be a financially responsible, high-impact organisation with strong governance and a clear path for growth. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, complemented by in-kind professional expertise and the dedication of volunteers, we are able to ensure that funds go directly to supporting program delivery. Our financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 highlight a year of significant growth, prudent management, and broad community support, all of which lay strong foundations for long-term sustainability.

A highlight of the year for commonkind was the privilege of being invited to speak at the Queensland Parliamentary Inquiry into Volunteering. This opportunity allowed us to share our experiences, advocate for innovative approaches, and champion a vision of one hour of meaningful community service per Queensland student, per school year. Contributing our voice to this important conversation is a privilege we value deeply.

None of these achievements would be possible without our amazing and dynamic CEO, Carolina Puleston. Carolina leads with a strong heart, combining vision, energy, and unwavering dedication. Her passion for positive change inspires our entire community to dream bigger, work harder, and never lose sight of kindness at the core of every action.




CEO MESSAGE

From Garage to Groundbreaking: Our Big Leap Forward

At its heart, commonkind is built up from the foundational premise that children and young people are not only the leaders of tomorrow, but they are also capable changemakers today.

We proudly offer meaningful and age-appropriate community service opportunities for children, young people, and families to support fellow Australians experiencing disadvantage.



What began as a simple idea in the early days of the COVID-19 lockdowns - to reduce social isolation and loneliness for older Australians and give children and young people a chance to give back while aged care homes were closed to visitors - has grown into something far greater. From hand-drawn cards and humble community giving appeals out of my garage, this year, that seed of an idea became a registered charity.





We are now officially recognised as a Public Benevolent Institution by the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission and have achieved DGR1 status with the ATO. These milestones go beyond administrative recognition - they are game changers. They give us a stable foundation to scale, a stronger funding pathway, and the ability to offer philanthropists a taxeffective way to support the next generation of changemakers.

Child safety is paramount in our work, so we developed our first Charter of Commitment to Children and Young People - six promises that create a safer, more inclusive environment for every child and young person who engages with us. Co-designed with young changemakers and their families, the Charter reflects both our values and our responsibility to embed safeguarding in everything we do, and ensures our safeguarding commitments are clear, meaningful, and easily understood by the children and young people they are designed to protect.

We also launched our Child and Youth Advisory Group - made up of students from Year 2 to Year 12 - because we believe children and young people should not just be the subject of change, they should be the leaders of it. Their ideas, feedback, and fierce creativity are now helping co-design programs that tackle poverty, hunger, and wellbeing. If these young people are the future, we are in good hands.

We believe service should inspire, not punish. When young people experience meaningful, hands-on giving early on, they are more likely to stay engaged for life. In this regard, this year, we hit our stride and expanded our reach. We piloted large-scale, whole-year group versions of our flagship school-based service-learning program, Learn by Heart, and broke our record with 130 students in a single session! That same school has already rebooked, showing just how powerful these experiences are.



Beyond our programs, a standout moment this year was being called as a witness at the Queensland Parliamentary Inquiry into Volunteering. We had the opportunity to advocate for a bold but achievable vision: one hour of meaningful community service per Queensland student, per school year. That's 875,000 hours annually - equivalent to over 400 full-time roles. If scaled to once per term, the impact would be seismic, not only for the charity sector now, but for Australia's future volunteering ecosystem.

As we look ahead to FY26, our focus is clear: grow our volunteer base, optimise our model, and expand our school-based service-learning program, Learn by Heart, to reach more schools and communities.

One of our young changemakers, Evie (10), joined us, reminding us that even the youngest voices have the power to shape our nation.



Two opportunities to build a stronger volunteering future for Australia are:

- Family-inclusive volunteering Making volunteering accessible to parents and carers reduces barriers for busy families, while modelling civic responsibility to children. This intergenerational approach not only supports today's needs but also cultivates tomorrow's volunteers.
- Engaging more children and young people in service learning Empowering young people helps serve today's community needs while growing tomorrow's volunteer leaders. If we included just one hour of community service for all Queensland school students in the curriculum, we could deliver ~875,000 hours of impact every year equivalent to over 400 full-time roles.

Principal activities

Commonkind Ltd has a mission to provide benevolent relief to people and communities suffering from poverty, disadvantage and distress by facilitating community service activities for children, families and other interested parties.

Commonkind Ltd will use community service to work towards the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for peace and prosperity for people and the planet.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

Director's commentary

Commonkind is a financially responsible, high-impact organisation with strong governance and a clear growth trajectory. Donor contributions are amplified through in-kind professional support and extensive volunteer engagement, ensuring funds directly benefit program delivery. The financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 reflect a year of significant growth, prudent management, an ability to attract diverse community support and strong foundations for sustainability.

1. Growth in Revenue & Diversified Income

- Total revenue increased from \$5,358 in 2024 to \$48,743 in 2025.
- º Importantly, income is diversified across cash donations, distributions, and significant in-kind/pro bono contributions from professionals and community partners.
- This mix demonstrates both trust from donors and confidence from corporate and community supporters.
- ° FY26 forecasts show a strong pipeline of revenue-generating opportunities from current and prospective partners we should continue the upward trajectory for revenue growth.

2. Effective Use of Resources

- Commonkind recorded a net surplus of \$20,266, showing careful management of resources and a commitment to reinvesting in mission outcomes.
- In-kind support, such as \$24,200 in professional legal services and donated goods, reflects strong external confidence and reduces reliance on cash expenditure.
- The lean operating model and income growth provide early validation of a sustainable long-term financial model.

3. Building Financial Strength

- Cash reserves of \$11,392 and receivables of \$8,874 provide a stable base for ongoing operations.
- With no liabilities recorded, Commonkind has entered FY2026 with positive net assets of \$20,266, positioning it well for future growth.

4. Transparency & Accountability

- Financial reporting complies with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and relevant accounting standards, ensuring accountability and transparency.
- Recognition of both cash and non-cash donations provides a true picture of the breadth of community support.

5. Strong Volunteer Commitment

- Beyond the financials, Commonkind's operations are well supported by volunteers demonstrating extraordinary commitment and lean, efficient operations.
- In particular, the founding CEO has exemplified leadership by personally investing both significant time and financial resources to establish and grow the organisation. This commitment underscores a strong belief in Commonkind's mission and ensures their interests are aligned with the interests of donors and partners.

6. Philanthropic Leverage

 Every donated dollar is amplified by pro bono contributions and volunteer effort. This ensures high impact per dollar invested and demonstrates Commonkind's ability to deliver programs efficiently with limited overheads.

Members guarantee

The company is incorporated under the *Corporations Act 2001* and is a company limited by guarantee. If the company is wound up, the Constitution states that each member is required to contribute to a maximum of \$10 each towards meeting any outstandings and obligations of the company. At 30 June 2025 the number of members was 1. The combined total amount that members of the company are liable to contribute if the company is wound up is \$10.

NOTE 1: BASIS OF PREPARATION

General information

The directors have determined that the company is not a reporting entity on the basis that, in the opinion of the directors, there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy, specifically, all of their information needs. Accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose financial report, which has been prepared to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

The financial report covers Commonkind Ltd as an individual entity. Commonkind Ltd is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Commonkind Ltd is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial report was approved by the directors at the date of the directors' report.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulations 2022, the recognition and measurement requirements specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of:

NOTE 1: BASIS OF PREPARATION (CONTINUED)

New and revised accounting standards effective at 30 June 2025

The company has applied all new and revised Australian Accounting Standards that apply for the first time at 30 June 2025. The application of these Australian Accounting Standards did not have a material impact on the company's financial statements.

Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied in the preparation and presentation of the financial report.

(a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits, short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

(b) Income from donations

Donations

Cash donations and goods donated for resale or use are recognised as income when the company obtains control of the goods. Goods and services donated are recognised at fair value as an asset and revenue.

Donated goods that are consumable in nature and held for distribution at no or nominal charge are assessed for materiality. If deemed immaterial, the goods are not recognised as inventory on the balance sheet. Instead, revenue and expense are recognised when the goods are distributed or consumed.

Volunteer contributions

The company has elected not to recognise volunteer services as either revenue or other form of contribution received. As such, any related consumption or capitalisation of such resources received is also not recognised.

(c) Income tax

The company has been endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office as a deductible gift recipient and is exempt from income tax under Subdivision 50-B of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(d) Other revenue and other income

Dividend and other distributions

Dividend and other distribution revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend or other distribution has been established. Dividends and other distributions received from associates and joint venture entities are accounted for in accordance with the equity method of accounting.

Interest

Interest revenue is measured in accordance with the effective interest method.

Donated Goods and Services

During the financial year, the company received donated goods and services from third-party entities, including professional legal advice and services. These goods and services were provided at no cost to the organisation and were integral to the delivery of our benevolent programs. In accordance with AASB 1058 and AASB 1004, donated goods and services are recognised in the financial statements only when the fair value of the services can be reliably measured and the goods or services would have otherwise been purchased. The following donated goods and services were recognised:

- Legal services valued at \$24,200
- Materials and stationery valued at \$754

These amounts have been recognised as income under "Non-cash Donations" and as corresponding expenses in the relevant categories.

Volunteer contributions

Other volunteer contributions, including general administrative support and community outreach, were not recognised due to measurement limitations but are acknowledged as essential to the organisation's operations. During the financial year ended 30 June 2025, Carolina Puleston (CEO) contributed approximately 1,350 hours.
